


If IONA AND THE ROSS OF MULL were a village of 100 people...

- > 6 would be in primary school; 2 would be in high school
- > 23 would be aged between 25 and 44
- > 21 would be aged 65 or over
- > 79 would be of working age (16-74), including
 - 18 who have no qualifications; 32 who have a University degree
 - 24 who work full time; 14 who are retired
- > 60 would describe themselves as 'White Scottish'
- 4 would describe their health as bad or very bad
- > 9 would be providing unpaid care
- > 35 would say they belonged to the Church of Scotland

If IONA AND THE ROSS OF MULL were a village of 100 households...

- > 43 households would consist of one person, 17 of whom are aged 65 and over
- > 16 would have have dependent children (aged under 16, or under 18 in full-time education)
- > 32 would be in rented accomodation
- > 84 would have access to at least one car or van
- > 8 would speak a language other than English in the home


Population Breakdown by Age-group





Population Breakdown by Ethnicity/Language



8% of households use a language other than English in the home (8%; 7%)









Population Breakdown by Health and Care Provision





Household Breakdown by Household Tenure







Household composition











