- > 89 would describe themselves as 'White Scottish'
- > 4 would describe their health as bad or very bad
- > 11 would be providing unpaid care
- > 49 would say they belonged to the Church of Scotland

#### If EASSIE, NEVAY AND NEWTYLE were a village of 100 households...


- > 29 households would consist of one person, 13 of whom are aged 65 and over






## Economic activity of those of working age (1)




