


If KEITH NORTH, NEWMILL, BOHARM AND ROTHIEMAY were a village of 100 people...

- > 85 would describe themselves as 'White Scottish'
- > 4 would describe their health as bad or very bad
- > 8 would be providing unpaid care
- > 42 would say they belonged to the Church of Scotland

If KEITH NORTH, NEWMILL, BOHARM AND ROTHIEMAY were a village of 100 households...

- > 32 households would consist of one person, 16 of whom are aged 65 and over
- > 24 would have have dependent children (aged under 16, or under 18 in full-time education)
- > 28 would be in rented accomodation
- > 82 would have access to at least one car or van
- > 11 would speak a language other than English in the home


Population Breakdown by Age-group



Population Breakdown by Ethnicity/Language









Household composition






