

If WESTRAY were a village of 100 people...

- > 4 would be in primary school; 4 would be in high school
- > 17 would be aged between 25 and 44
- > 27 would be aged 65 or over
- > 74 would be of working age (16-74), including
 - 37 who have no qualifications; 16 who have a University degree
 - 18 who work full time; 14 who are retired
- > 80 would describe themselves as 'White Scottish'
- > 5 would describe their health as bad or very bad
- > 12 would be providing unpaid care
- > 44 would say they belonged to the Church of Scotland

If WESTRAY were a village of 100 households...


- > 34 households would consist of one person, 19 of whom are aged 65 and over
- > 20 would have have dependent children (aged under 16, or under 18 in full-time education)
- > 24 would be in rented accomodation
- > 88 would have access to at least one car or van
- > 10 would speak a language other than English in the home








Population Breakdown by Health and Care Provision








Economic activity of those of working age (1)





What to do next

This profile has given you some information about your local community from Scotland's Census 2011. This is not an end in itself, but rather a starting place for you to explore further.

These include *Who is my neighbour*, training materials for making use of this profile for different purposes, and *Future Focus*, a process to examine the life of the congregation and community.

Questions to consider might include:

- > What is the profile of our congregation?
- > How does it compare to the local population?
- > What other churches are in the area? Which parts of the community do they reach? Which parts of the community are being missed?
- What other local organisations or centres are there that might bring people into our parish? Examples might include work, public services, leisure, shops and voluntary organisations. How can we interact with these people?
- > What areas of our parish do we know well, or less well?
- > How does the local community change between weekdays and weekends?

All parish-level Census data is based on 2011 Census Output Areas as released by National Records of Scotland (<u>www.nrscotland.gov.uk</u>). An Output Area is associated with a parish if its population weighted centroid falls within the parish boundary.
